President's Message

Dear Badgers,

It is with great sadness that I must inform you that lifetime member Wil Ward recently passed away. Last month, we learned that Wil, who had probably held every office in the club, including show chair, was released from the hospital, following cardiac complications. The club promptly sent a flower arrangement and card to his home, where we wished him the best on his recovery. At our last meeting, we had also voted to name the annual picnic, which will be held next month, the Wil Ward Annual Picnic, in his honor. He will be sorely missed by all who knew him, and his selfless accomplishments, over *decades* of service on behalf of the BLGS, will long be remembered.

As recounted by treasurer Daisy Peterson, the club did very well, in both attendance and net income, at our 2012 annual show. Our two-day attendance reached 946 people, slightly greater than any figure attained over the previous four years. Net income was also substantial, and will enable the club to continue doing the kinds of things that we have enjoyed in the past, such as subsidizing a portion of the Christmas banquet expenses. We also voted to host a 2013 show, with Teri agreeing to serve again as show chair. So we may begin to plan a renewal of our most complicated, yet rewarding, form of community service.

The collecting season is now pretty much upon us. Last weekend was the first collecting trip of the year for fossil cephalopods to Graf, Iowa, and after the meeting this month, members will be visiting the Rufer Quarry in Monroe, for either minerals (e.g., pyrite, sphalerite, and galena) or fossils. Later on this month is a collecting trip for Lake Superior agates to Bellevue, Iowa. And numerous field trips are being arranged over the summer.

You'll find a 2012 list of members and their contact information enclosed within this newsletter. I've adapted it from the online Editgrid, which is also maintained by Daisy. It has been two years since a similar list was published, so it is overdue. Please let Daisy or I know of any errors found or changes needed in the membership list.

I wish you well in your upcoming collecting endeavors, both club-related and personal, and look forward to hearing about those experiences from you later this year.

Monroe Quarry Fieldtrip

Place: Local Quarry in Monroe, WI

Date: This Saturday!, May 12th, 2012

Meeting Time & Place: We will start our normal meeting at the Monroe Library @ 10:00 AM. This will be a short meeting. Anyone going to the quarry should meet us at 11:15 at the Monroe Library 2nd floor meeting room. At 11:30 we'll leave the library and head to the quarry. When we get to the quarry we'll have a quick safety talk and then go in as a group. Please do not head down to the quarry early! This makes us look unorganized and jeopardizes future trips.

What to bring: This is an active quarry so **Hard Hats and Safety Glasses are required**. Sack Lunch, as we will be eating lunch in Quarry., hard rock bustin' tools such as Geologist and Masons hammers, chisels (with handguard is best), sledgehammers, pry bars, sunscreen and plenty of water and liquids! I will bring the club chop saw.

What we will hopefully find: Fossils (horn coral, cephalopods, cerarus sp. trilobites, shells), minor sphalerite, galena, calcite, & iridescent pyrite. The sharpest things here are cephalopod cavities filled with pyrite xls!

Notes: We have permission to visit two quarries, which are located across the road from each other. We will enter quarry as a group and leave the quarry as a group (no single stragglers hanging out alone). No bathroom facilities in quarry. This has been an excellent producing quarry. Hardhats must be worn in the quarry and we should stay back a safe distance (a bounce and a half at

least) from any high walls, leave the place as clean or cleaner than we found it, do not block or dig in any obvious roadways, stay off and away from any structures or machinery in the quarry, etc.. This trip is opened to all MWF members.

Please be aware that we ask for special permission from the owner to visit this site just once per year, so please take advantage of visiting this site as a group when it is scheduled. Please do not contact the owner for additional access or visit the site without permission. This could lose access for everyone.

A Fluorite Tale by Teri Marché

I hate to use a tired old *cliché* but last weekend truth really was stranger than fiction. It actually started in Tucson last February, when we were given information about a quarry owner in Elizabethtown, IL who would truck fluorite material into his quarry, and sometimes let folks dig. So when Mike Riesch and I finally got an Illinois trip together, we determined to check it out. A call to the Hastie Quarry preceded the trip; we were to call again the day before we were ready to visit.

That didn't exactly work out, so there we were on Saturday morning, driving past Rosiclaire to Elizabethtown, hunting information about the quarry.



The town is a small Ohio river town, down on its luck, with a tiny main street of mostly empty storefronts. As we pulled up to the town's stop sign, I saw two fellows chatting on the porch of an abandoned restaurant.

One of them, the older of the two, was well informed about the Hastie Quarries because he had worked in them for years. He informed us that the quarry we wanted was actually back down the road in Rosiclaire. Rather than try to give us directions, he offered to show us the way.

During our conversation, I asked if he knew anyone with fluorite for sale. Actually he did, but for love or money, he just could not remember the actual name of the father-son duo who were known locally as the "Smothers Brothers" for the comical stories they tell. These two were still mining fluorite and were somehow connected to Hastie. They live outside of town, down a lane between two houses so it looks like the driveway to one house, but it is not. Anyway, he could not recall the name or describe how to get to the house. So we followed him to Rosiclaire.

The quarry gate was half open, but he told us that meant the fellow was there to collect samples for testing. Hastie was not there and we should not go in. Instead we should go to the other quarry in Cave-in-Rock where there would be someone in the office to talk to. OK, thanks, and back we go through Elizabethtown to the other quarry where we spoke to

the secretary who informed us that we'd missed Hastie by an hour, that what he trucks into Rosiclaire is bagged, processed fluorite, and try again in an hour or so when Hastie may be back.

I suggested we visit the fluorite museum in Rosiclaire to kill some time, so off we go, back through Elizabethtown to Rosiclaire. We missed the turn to the museum, and



ended up at the Ohio River where I just had to walk down the shore a bit. On the way back through

town, we saw another older fellow going into the Dollar Store. I called out to him for directions to the museum, which he kindly provided, mentioning however, that the museum was closed. So I asked him about folks with fluorite for sale. Now this is where it gets weird.

Sure he knew someone selling fluorite, and if we wanted to follow him home, he'd happily sell us



some. So we waited while he finished some errands in Rosiclaire and then followed him back through Elizabethtown, off onto a side road and down a lane between two houses that looks

like a driveway to one but is not. Yes, he mines fluorite with his son and grandson on land leased from Hastie. Yup, it was the same guy. What are the chances?

Greg, Gary, and Walter Griffith are truly a hoot! They are a goldmine of local lore, and a great source of mining history told in the most entertaining way. They bill themselves as Griffith Fluorite and Fluorspar, providing Fluorite Diamonds and Specimens. Specimens are displayed on racks out back. They put them outside in the weather for cleaning. The really pricey stuff is kept in a pair of old refrigerators for protection.

Their mine produces water-clear fluorite from which they create the “diamonds,” actually octahedrons cleaved from lower quality material. They must spend hours doing this, all three of them, because they have gazillions of all sizes and colors. They’ll show you how it is done, slick as can be! There is also plenty of purple fluorite, pale purple-pink fluorite, and clear fluorite colored green-gray by marcasite. They also have some galena, honey-colored calcite and “raccoon tail” rock (banded with white barite).



We picked out some specimens and diamonds, petted their St. Bernard, laughed at their stories, and had a generally great time before heading out, hours later, to dig some fluorite of our own. But we’ll be back.

Wil Ward Remembered

Dear Badgers. It is with very heavy heart that I am writing to inform you that longtime member of the rock club, Wil Ward, passed away succumbing to the abrupt illness that struck him earlier this year. An email from Wil's son informed us that Wil passed away on April 24th. Unfortunately the email didn't reach the club until just recently so the delay in announcing Wil's passing to all of you could not be helped.

Wil was a much respected, much loved friend to all in the Badger Rock Club and will be missed in earnest. I am glad that my family and I joined the club in time to get to know Wil and can now only wish I had gotten to know him better. I learned I could count on Wil to always give a friendly handshake, smile and kind word. His genuine interest in the welfare of the people in the club was also apparent from his generous nature, supportive discussions, and wise advice offered when most needed. Perhaps the club member who knew Wil best is Dave Zimmerman. I was hoping Dave could be contacted in time to write this remembrance about Wil, but I haven't been able to reach him. Dave was quick to send a very nice letter to the club with some thoughts about Wil when he first heard Wil's illness was serious. Dave never intended the letter to be printed in memoriam, but I feel the letter pays due honors to the debt we owe Wil Ward and describes some of what made Wil special to the club, and so I've included the letter below. Incidentally, it was Dave Zimmerman's suggestion in his letter below that we name the club picnic after Wil Ward. It was a great idea and passed by unanimous vote at our last meeting.

On 4/4/12, David Zimmerman wrote:

> Hey Gang,

I hope the show went well and that the weather cooperated as good as it can. I do actually miss the show-time down there!

It saddens me to hear the news about Wil, but it does not come as a surprise....remembering that he left an MSHA meeting once to drive himself to the hospital while having a heart-attack.

If memory serves me right, Wil was not a founding member, having joined in the club's second year of existence. That certainly should not downplay the HUGE role he has served in making the club what it is today though. Not only has he served in almost all of the club's officer rolls, (including President, VP, and Treasurer), he was the Show Chair for many years and also was the Field Trip Chair as well. He, undoubtedly, is the longest active member that the club has ever had. When I was President of the club, I had to preside while Bill Figi was laid to rest, and there were calls to honor him with a memorial or such...donning his name on the show, or the newsletter, and such. I resisted that at the time, thinking that the club has had many giant members in the history of the club and we have never named something after them, and the thought of a precedence was a bit much for me. I do wish, in retrospect, that I would've done more at the time.

I think I wrangled Wil into accepting a Lifetime Membership many years ago, which he reluctantly accepted, but I would urge the club to consider something a bit more appropriate for a man that has done so much for the club. I'm not even sure if naming something after him would be the right avenue, but possibly naming the annual picnic might be an idea. Maybe naming a gold-brick after him, or an annual award....the Wil Ward Award sure rolls of the tongue nicely. And the Willy goes to.....I'm sure many people will have lots of good ideas, but I do hope that the club decides to do something in appreciation. I really think that the club would not exist, or would be in a much reduced capacity if it were not for his work back in the 60's, 70's, and 80's. Unfortunately there are no other members left in the club that remember all the hard work that he has done over the years with the club.
